Please complete the checklist and submit it with the manuscript.

Authors, who are inexperienced in scientific writing or not proficient in English, are advised to have their manuscript checked by a senior colleague before submission. Manuscripts that do not follow the Asian Fisheries Science format or are poorly written will be rejected or returned to the authors without assessment. Eighty per cent of the manuscripts fall into this category and are rejected.

1.	Authors have prepared the manuscript based on the "Guide for Authors" and "Code of Ethics" of the Asian Fisheries Science.	
2.	The manuscript meets the scope of the journal. For example, a study on the taxonomy of aquatic snails not directly related to fisheries science is not within the journal's scope.	
3.	All authors have read and approved the submitted version of the manuscript.	
4.	All authors have confirmed their names, institutions and email addresses have been correctly uploaded.	
5.	Cover letter uploaded mentioning the highlight of the findings and the role and contribution of each author. Note: Only those who have made a significant contribution (involved in experiment design, writing manuscript) should be listed; others (review of manuscript) should be listed in Acknowledgements.	
6.	Title page containing only the title of the article has been uploaded.	
7.	The manuscript file has been uploaded as a single Word file as "Main Document". The manuscript should have the following sections: i) Title, ii) Abstract, iii) Keywords, iv) Introduction, v) Materials and Methods, vi) Results, vii) Discussions, viii) Conclusion, ix) Acknowledgements, and x) References. Results and Discussions are not combined (unless it is a short communication). The manuscript does not list the names of authors.	

8.	The abstract does not exceed 250 words and pasted into the space provided and also uploaded as a file.	
9.	Spell check and grammar check have been performed.	
10.	The entire manuscript is double-spaced, technically sound and written in good and correct British English.	
11.	The title is informative and clear.	
12.	Headings and sub-headings in all sections are clearly indicated.	
13.	All abbreviations and acronyms are defined at first mention.	
14.	Have provided full Latin name of all individual species along with the authority with the correct use of parenthesis at first mention in the title, abstract and the body of the paper. For example; <i>Cyprinus carpio</i> Linnaeus, 1758 and <i>Lates calcarifer</i> (Bloch, 1790).	
15.	Sufficient sample size and replicates for the experimental design has been ensured. Statistical information, e.g. standard errors or standard deviation, number of samples taken (n =) provided. Graphs should indicate experimental error (error bars) and statistical significance (a, b, c,...) should be indicated clearly.	
16.	Equations are inserted using the Equation Editor.	
17.	Superscripts instead of the bar (/) for compound units including tables and figures have been used. For example: fishmeal/kg should be fishmeal.kg ⁻¹	
18.	Degree symbol (°C) is inserted from the symbols menu and not zero or alphabet "o" superscript.	
19.	Multiplication symbols are used (×; insert from symbol) and not small "x" letters.	
20.	Spaces are inserted between numerical value and unit symbol, e.g. 9 %, 4 cm, 26 °C and between value and ±, =, ×, e.g. 0.239 ± 0.092; n = 64; 5 × 6.	
21.	Tables and figures appear in the text where they are mentioned in the first instance and not separately.	
22.	Photographs provided are sharp with a legible scale bar.	
23.	References follow the journal format and those cited in the text are also present in the reference list and vice versa.
